# Sacred Heart VA Catholic Primary School, Swaffham, celebrates an exciting first year

The new school of Sacred Heart came into existence on the 1<sup>st</sup> September 2019. The school is funded by the Government and supported by the Diocese of East Anglia. This became the start of an exciting time of growth and the opportunity for the children and families of Swaffham and surrounding areas. We began life on the grounds of the existing all through school, which has meant we have been able to take over the facilities that many primary schools would be envious of. We have a dedicated computer room, a science lab, a home economics room, a library, a gymnasium and a huge sports barn with additional tennis courts as well as a large field and outdoor learning areas.

We are a growing school with dedicated staff. We have classes from Reception through to Year 6 and have places available in each year group. We have capacity to be a one form entry primary school of 210 children. The Catholic nature of our school means that we are universal in our approach to those who attend the school. The fundamental Christian values and ethos permeates the way in which we deliver the curriculum and support our families in their children's learning journey and their faith. We have fun and enjoy our learning and are excited about the future.

Like all schools across the country our first year has been interrupted by Covid-19. Our staff have been on hand to support the children to continue their learning both at home and for those able to attend school. This has taken shape in many different forms, this is what some of our children have said about the time during lockdown

"I felt like a new girl again because I hadn't been in for such a long time. I was excited because I could see my friends and teachers but nervous because I wasn't sure how school would be and I couldn't

get too close to my friends in the playground. There were some changes in the school, we all have our own desks and stationery so no sharing and no quarrels, brilliant! We have to sit in lines to keep 2 metres apart, but we get to eat our lunch at our desks every day. We have to move around the school in one direction and there is a lot of lining up, 2 metres apart, to wash our hands as only one person can be in the toilets at one time. We are all enjoying being back because we get more teacher time and also more downtime stuff like art, colouring and puzzles. As there are only a few of us we get to do different things that we don't usually have room for - like



learning to do the Cha Cha Slide to help us with our maths position and direction vocabulary - we are all cool movers!"

During 'Lockdown', the children were very keen to do some art and decided to make an Underwater Sea display to brighten up the gym/assembly hall, hoping it will cheer everyone up when all pupils return to school.

"I really enjoyed making it all, especially the squids and all the different techniques I had to use. I hope the display brings a smile to people's faces."



"I liked being in the art/science room, the older children use it normally, we made a penguin for Miss Lewis as they are her favourite animal."

Year 6 voted to explore how rockets are made, they designed and made their own.



We are gaining new pupils all the time and looking forward to the new normal in September 2020. We are keen to attract even more pupils and encourage parents to contact the school and come and see our wonderful school.

#### Retirement – Mrs Imelda Cooper July 2020

After 19 years service Mrs Cooper is retiring from the post of Head of School from St Mary's Roman Catholic Primary School in Lowestoft.

Interviewed and employed in 2001 as yr3 teacher by the then Head Teacher, now school Governor Mrs Beryl Edwards, within a very short time Imelda became Religious Education subject leader, a post she held throughout her career.

Working under 4 head teachers, Imelda soon became an outstanding Early Years teacher (an Ofsted Inspectors official verdict, and the opinion of many of her peers!) and was promoted to the position of Deputy Head in 2015.



After a school restructure in 2018, Imelda was promoted to the post of Head of School in early 2019 working with a new Executive Head Mrs Crane.

Described by her peers "Imelda will be remembered for her calm, measured and devout leadership which is the embodiment of our school and its ethos. She has always provided a strong link between the Parish and school and will be sorely missed by all staff."

When asked Imelda said she fondly remembers whole school events such as the Bishops picnics on the school field, school Masses, the annual Pilgrimage to Walsingham and all events where parents, children and staff could come together to celebrate. She will miss most School Assemblies and the opportunity to impart the teachings of our Lord to the very attentive children of St Mary's.

Imelda's plans for retirement included travelling, although that has somewhat been curtailed in the short term, as well as supporting the local parish in any way she can.

Mrs Cooper will leave a lasting legacy on St Mary's and will be missed by all including the staff, governors, parents and especially the children.

Mrs Cooper will be succeeded by Ewa Parker as the new Head of School. Ewa is currently the Deputy Headteacher at St Mary's in Long Stratton, Norwich. Mrs Parker is delighted to be taking over and is very excited to join the team. All staff and governors look forward to welcoming her in September.

So in many ways we are celebrating the leadership of our school developing to support not just our own pupils but a wider body of young people in our Trust, and it is wonderful that we can congratulate both Mrs Hope and Mrs Payne for their successful appointments to new posts.

#### School Buildings Update – Helen Bates, Assistant Director, Diocesan Schools' Service

Despite the many practical difficulties presented by the current pandemic, it has been possible to progress most schools' premises related matters albeit more slowly at times than would otherwise be the case. Here is an update on a selection of schemes currently taking place.


Our Lady of Walsingham MAT was successful with two out of its three bids to the Condition Improvement Fund, an impressive success rate. These bids will provide more than £345,000 of central government grant to replace the boiler plant at St Pancras in Ipswich and the roof on the original building at St Louis in Newmarket.

St Laurence in Cambridge has finally seen its multi-purpose room built. This has been a number of years in the planning. There were a number of obstacles to overcome, not least gaining DfE approval to build on the edge of the playing field. This approval was finally received after involvement by the local MP and the CES. The room will be used to support the PE curriculum, for group teaching and for meetings.

St Edmunds in Bury St Edmunds was successful in its bid to Suffolk County Council to host one of seven SEN units to deliver support for KS2 children with cognition and learning needs. These units will provide a safe, nurturing environment as a base for integration into mainstream education, in a facility much closer to home for these children than would otherwise be the case. The unit at St Edmunds is planned to open in September 2021 and the school is currently working with the Diocese and their architect on the building design, the cost of which will be met by Suffolk County Council.

The new two-storey building at St Benedict's in Bury St Edmunds is nearing completion. This will provide two new science labs and represents the last stage of the school's amalgamation onto one site. In addition the £1.7M scheme, which also saw six additional general classrooms being provided last September through three modular units, will refurbish existing accommodation to provide two new technology rooms.

Design development work has begun on St John Henry Newman School, the new 3FE primary school in Peterborough. The school will also have a 26 place nursery and is due to open in September 2022. The Diocese is working in partnership with Peterborough City Council to deliver this school through the DfE's Modern Methods of Construction Framework. This will see much of the structure built offsite, which should allow for a quicker construction programme. Capital funding for the school will come from DfE and Peterborough City Council. Whilst this design and building process continues, the Diocese is also starting to look at some of the other aspects of opening a new school including the appointment of a shadow governing body and senior leaders. Advertisements for staff appointments will appear on the Diocesan website.
