~~~ What is Marriage? ~~~

"The matrimonial covenant, by which a man and a woman establish between themselves a partnership of the whole of life, is by its nature ordered toward the good of the spouses and the procreation and education of offspring; this covenant between baptized persons has been raised by Christ the Lord to the dignity of a sacrament."

- Catechism of the Catholic Church 1601

God himself is the author of marriage. The mutual love of husband and wife, due to their creation as man and woman, is an image of God's unfailing love for mankind.

The marriage service is a solemn and moving ceremony in which the man and woman pledge their word to God and to each other to be loyal and faithful until death.

Whenever both partners are baptised Christians the grace of the Sacrament is conferred

Part A:

General Information about Marriage in the Catholic Church

1. What should we do first?

First, contact your Parish Priest and begin discussing your wedding plans, your situation and the wedding dates you are interested in. Do not book reception venues, flowers, or other arrangements without first speaking to the Parish Priest and setting a date for your wedding in the Church.

If either of you has been married before, you must disclose this to the Priest before making any arrangements.

The Diocese of East Anglia requires at least 6 months' notice of your intention to marry.

2. Are there any dates when we cannot be married?

Marriage cannot be celebrated on Good Friday or Holy Saturday (i.e. the Friday and Saturday before Easter Sunday).

3. Can we marry on a beach, in a hotel, or at a venue that is not a Church?

No. While it may seem romantic to marry where you proposed or where family and friends can enjoy a holiday, a Catholic marriage is a solemn promise made before God. You are asking for His blessing for the rest of your life together. Therefore, the most appropriate place for a Catholic marriage is in the house of God—a Catholic Church.

Only in rare and serious circumstances, the Bishop may permit a wedding to take place in "another suitable place." Examples include situations such as a hospital bedside if one of the parties is gravely ill, or in cases of war or natural disaster.

4. Can we get married in a Christian Church that isn't Catholic?

Possibly. Catholics are ordinarily required to be married in a Catholic Church. However, if there is a sufficiently important reason, the Bishop may grant a, so called, *Dispensation from Canonical Form*, allowing the wedding to take place in another Christian church.

Acceptable reasons may include a close family connection, such as the father of one of the parties being a Baptist minister or Church of England pastor. Aesthetic preferences alone (e.g. "it's a prettier church") are not sufficient.

It is good pastoral practice for the Catholic Priest to be invited to give the Nuptial Blessing at the end of the ceremony, as a sign of support and Christian unity. Your Parish Priest may be happy to do this if he is available.

Please note: even if a Catholic is marrying in a non-Catholic church, attendance at a Catholic marriage preparation course is still required.

5. My fiancé is a non-Christian (Muslim, Hindu, etc). Can we marry in the Catholic Church? Is extra paperwork needed?

Yes, this is colloquially called an interfaith marriage.

Your Parish Priest will need to apply for a, so called, *Dispensation from Disparity of Cult* from the Bishop, but he will take care of that during your appointment. You do not need to prepare anything in advance.

6. My fiancé is a non-Catholic baptised Christian. Can we get married in the Catholic Church?

Yes, this is known colloquially as a mixed marriage.

You will need Permission from the Bishop of the Diocese, which your Parish Priest will arrange during your meeting. Again, no preparation is needed from you in advance.

7. My fiancé is not baptised (e.g. Muslim, Hindu, Jewish etc), can we marry in their non-Christian place of worship?

Whilst it is not impossible for a Catholic to marry someone who has not been baptised, or for the marriage to take place in a non-Christian place of worship, such cases require special permission, given only after very careful consideration in exceptional circumstances. This is because of difficulties which may arise during married life and bringing up children due to real differences in religious faith, practice, and values. In such cases, you are advised to speak to your parish priest as soon as possible who will then be able to help you explore what may be possible.

Each case will be looked at individually.

8. What does the Catholic Church say about marriages between Catholics and non-Catholics?

Because the marriage establishes a bond between a man and a woman for their whole life, joining and unifying them in every way, the two spouses would ideally share the same religious conviction and practice, so that the unity and partnership of their marriage might be as complete as possible, and so they can be completely 'one' with each other in every aspect of their life.

However, the Church recognises that couples may fall in love across religious differences. While these differences are not seen as insurmountable, the Church cautions couples not to underestimate the challenges of mixed or interfaith marriages—especially as the years go by and when raising their children together.

Many Protestant pastors and other faith leaders also give this advice.

This is why in any marriage between a Catholic and non-Catholic, the Catholic fiancé is required to obtain special Permission or Dispensation from the Bishop in order to marry.

The Catholic fiancé will also be required to sign a Declaration saying that they will not be pressured into abandoning their Catholic faith, they will remain faithful to their Catholic duties as a parent which includes raising the children in the faith. This Declaration is signed during the appointment with the Priest when the Pre Nuptial paperwork is completed.

The Church does *not* require the non-Catholic to convert to Catholicism but it would be helpful for them to have a good understanding of their Catholic fiancé's faith.

Be sure to discuss together the importance of your faith, and the promise that you will make to raise your children in the Catholic Church and what that will involve in practice (that is; baptism, weekly mass, praying together, First Holy Communion classes, Confirmation, bringing them to Confession, raising them Catholic etc).

If the non-Catholic feels similarly strongly about raising the children in *their* particular faith, you will need to have serious discussion about the matter before proceeding further with your wedding plans.

9. Can we write our own vows?

No. Because Catholic marriage involves specific promises, the wording of the vows must reflect the Church's understanding of marriage. This ensures that the couple knows exactly what they are committing to.

However, couples are welcome to express their personal love and hopes for the future during wedding reception speeches.

10. What kind of service can we have for our wedding?

You may choose one of the following:

- · Wedding Service Includes hymns, prayers, Scripture readings, exchange of vows, and the Nuptial Blessing. Does not include Holy Communion.
- · Nuptial Mass A full Mass that includes the wedding ceremony and the Eucharist (Holy Communion).

11. Can we choose our own readings?

Yes, but they must be from the Bible. A list of suggested Scripture readings is available at the end of this document.

If you have a poem or piece of writing that is meaningful to you, the reception is the best place to share it.

12. Can we choose our own music?

Yes, but it should be sacred in character—whether modern or traditional.

Remember: your wedding is an act of worship, taking place in God's house. The music should reflect this. For this reason, non-religious music is not appropriate for a Church ceremony.

You will need to book the Church organist or pianist in advance. You may also be allowed to bring your own musicians if agreed with the Priest. A choir or cantor from the Church may also be available upon request.

13. Do our bridesmaids and best man have to be Catholic?

No. The official witness on behalf of the Church is the Priest or Deacon. Your bridal party members are not official witnesses for the Church, so they do not need to be Catholic.

14. What preparation does the Church require?

All couples must attend Catholic marriage preparation before their wedding. The course helps couples understand the sacred nature of the sacrament, the lifelong commitment involved, the gift and responsibilities of parenthood, amongst many other things.

See Part B of this document for details about the Diocese of East Anglia's preparation course.

15. Should we go to Confession before our wedding?

Yes, it is highly recommended.

Just as you wouldn't arrive at your wedding physically unclean, your soul should also be cleansed for such a holy occasion. If you are aware of serious sins—such as sexual intercourse before marriage—you must go to Confession before receiving Holy Communion.

Do not be afraid. The priest is bound by the seal of confession and will never repeat anything you say. He is there to welcome you back to God and offer healing.

16. Practicalities for the Wedding Day

- · Organist Contact via the Parish Priest. You may bring your own with permission.
- · Choir/Cantor Ask the organist about availability and fees.
- · Altar Servers May be available depending on the Church.
- · Flowers Ask the Priest about the parish flower team or bring your own.
- · Order of Service The Priest can help with this; you may need to print it yourself.
- · Ushers Useful to welcome guests, hand out Orders of Service, and assist with seating. Traditionally in the UK, the bride's guests sit on the left and the groom's on the right, but nowadays guests are often encouraged to sit where they like.

17. Who will be the Priest at our wedding?

Normally, the Parish Priest of the Church where the wedding takes place will celebrate the Nuptial Mass or Wedding Service. If another Priest (e.g. a relative or friend) is to conduct the wedding, this must be arranged well in advance with the Parish Priest. Deacons may also conduct a Wedding Service (but not a Nuptial Mass).

18. Do we need to make a donation to the Priest?

There is no official charge for a Catholic wedding (unlike in the Church of England, which has fixed fees).

Some parishes suggest a fixed donation to help cover Church running costs and administrative work. Others leave it up to the couple. It is customary to give the Priest and key participants a monetary thank-you gesture. Also consider thanking the organist, florist, altar servers, choir, etc., for their time and contribution.

Marriage Preparation in the Diocese of East Anglia

Welcome to marriage preparation in the Diocese of East Anglia! This programme is an extensive and comprehensive preparation for Catholic marriage.

The full marriage preparation course consists of both:

1. One full Saturday Day.

During this day we will cover the theology of marriage and marital love, as well as practical marriage skills including communication issues, financial management, conflict resolution, addressing the past, theology of the body, sexuality and more.

You do not need to bring anything along to this day, just yourselves!

These Saturday sessions take place in *Our Lady Immaculate and St Etheldreda Church* in Newmarket. You only need to attend one day. Each Saturday Day is identical in content, please choose the date that works best for you.

At the end of the Saturday Day you will be given a **certificate** that you should show as proof of attendance to the Priest who is arranging your paperwork.

2. Four sessions using the Diocese's own **So Great A Mystery** course. These should be done with you and your priest, in your own parish. This course offers a catechetical introduction to the sacramental nature of Catholic marriage. For these four sessions you need to contact your local Parish Priest. (please note: not all parishes offer these four sessions all year round, so it might not be possible to do it.).

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

18. Do we have to do a marriage preparation course?

Yes, all couples are required to receive preparation for marriage if they want to get married in the Catholic Church, regardless of where in the world they are getting married.

19. What does marriage preparation in our Diocese consists of?

Marriage preparation consists of both:

a. One Saturday Day (click here to book this).

and also

b. The So Great A Mystery course in your local parish (contact your local Parish Priest.) NB: Not all parishes offer this course all year round

20. What is the cost of marriage preparation?

The cost is £125 per couple. Please contact Antonia if you have financial difficulties. Please pay either by:

21. Can I attend either the course or the Saturday Day?

The full course consists of both the Saturday Day course <u>and also</u> the parish-based So Great A Mystery course, as they cover different topics.

NB: Some parishes are unable to offer the So Great A Mystery course all year round, in which case the Saturday Day course alone will be accepted.

22. Do I have to attend the course before the Saturday Day?

No, they cover different topics so it doesn't matter which one you do first.

23. How do I book for the So Great A Mystery parish course?

These classes are done at a local parish level, so please contact your local Catholic parish church.

24. What if only one of us can attend the Saturday Day?

The Saturday Day consists of couple work which you both do together on the day, so it is vital that you both attend the Saturday Day together. But if one of you is abroad and therefore unable to attend, then you can come alone. Please tell Antonia mflcoordinator@rcdea.org.uk

25. What if we are unable attend either the Saturday Day or the parish sessions?

If you are unable to attend any of the face-to-face courses offered by the Diocese, then please contact Antonia Braithwaite mflcoordinator@rcdea.org.uk



26. How soon before my wedding do I need to do the marriage preparation course?

You can attend a marriage preparation course any time about two years before your wedding.

But please note that the official paperwork can only be dated a maximum of six months before your wedding date.

27. How soon before my wedding do I need to meet with the Priest to do my paperwork?

The Church paperwork which the Priest fills in with you cannot be dated more than six months before your wedding.

28. What happens once we have finished the marriage preparation course?

Once you have completed the marriage preparation course, you will receive a certificate, and you can meet with your Parish Priest to finalise your paperwork.

Couples need to meet with their local Parish Priest in East Anglia to do their paperwork even if they are getting married elsewhere, as it is the responsibility of the Diocese where the couple live to do their documentation, not the Diocese in which they are getting married. The completed paperwork will then be sent to the Diocese where the couple are planning on getting married.



29. What paperwork do I need to have ready for the appointment with the Priest?
At the appointment with the Priest please ensure you each have the following documents with you: (NB: not all of these may be relevant to you).
Please note: <u>originals copies only</u> , no photocopies or scans. They do not need to be translated into English; the original language is acceptable.
□ Marriage Preparation Certificate of Completion
□ Passport/ID
□ A cheque for £20 made payable to 'RC Diocese of East Anglia' (or cash in an envelope) (if you are getting married outside of East Anglia. See questions below for more information).
□ Baptism certificate*
*This must be an original. It does not need to be translated into English. You will need to contact the Church where you were baptised and explain that you are getting married and ask them to issue you with a <u>baptism certificate for marriage</u> . This certificate should be dated a <u>maximum of 6 months before your wedding date</u> and it needs to indicate the date and place of baptism, whether or not you have been Confirmed as well as any details regarding previous marriages or ordination or religious vows.
□ Pre-Nuptial Information Form (Click here to find PDF download) **
** Fill in all your personal details but do not sign anything on this form. You will sign it in front of your Parish Priest.
□ Statutory Declaration of Freedom to Marry Form *** (Click here to find PDF download)
***Print off one copy each. This form needs to be completed before a Solicitor/Public Notary/Commissioner of Oaths. You need to Google a convenient one and make an appointment with any one of them. Then take the forms with you and your fiancé and you need to sign it in front of them.
NB: If you are already civilly married you do not need to complete this form. Also, if you are getting married abroad and are required to prove your legal freedom to marry in that country/ consulate/ embassy then that paperwork is sufficient, you don't need to do another one.

30. My fiancé was baptised in a non-Catholic Church, does s/he need to obtain a baptism certificate dated six months before our wedding?

No. It would be ideal if they were able to get a certificate dated six months before the wedding confirming their baptism, but if they are unable to, then their original certificate from the day they were baptised will suffice even if it is many years old.

31. I am getting married outside this Diocese, can the Priest in that Church do my paperwork?

The Church norms are that the Diocese where <u>you live</u> is responsible for doing your paperwork. This will then be sent to the Diocese where you are getting married. So you should contact your local Parish Priest here in East Anglia to do your paperwork.

32. What happens at the appointment with my Parish Priest?

Once you have completed the marriage preparation course you will need to make an appointment with your Parish Priest or his Secretary and take with you <u>all</u> the relevant paperwork listed in Question 29 above (this is vital!).

In front of the priest you then sign the Declaration at the bottom of Page 2 of the Pre-Nuptial Information Form, and if only one of you is a Catholic, then the Catholic must make the promise before the priest on the bottom of Page 3.

33. What happens next if I am getting married:

- in my local Catholic Parish here in East Anglia
- in another Catholic Church in East Anglia
- in another Catholic Church in England and Wales?

If you are getting married <u>in your own Catholic Parish here in East Anglia</u> then the signed paperwork stays with your Parish Priest (unless you require a Dispensation or Permission, in which case he will send the paperwork to the Chancellor, and it will then be returned to the Parish Priest).

If you are getting married <u>in a different Catholic Parish in the Diocese of East Anglia</u> where you are not parishioners then your Parish Priest will grant permission for you to do so (page 4 on the Pre-Nuptial Form) and then send the paperwork to the Parish Priest in East Anglia where you intend to marry (unless you require a Dispensation or Permission, in which case he will send the paperwork to the Chancellor, and it will then be returned to the Parish Priest).

If you are getting married <u>in a Catholic Parish outside of East Anglia</u>, <u>but within the Episcopal Conference of England and Wales</u>, then your Parish Priest will grant permission for you to do so (page 4 on the Pre-Nuptial Form) and send your paperwork to the Chancellor, who will then send it directly to the parish where the marriage will take place.

NB: you will need to provide a £20 cheque made payable to 'RC Diocese of East Anglia' or cash in an envelope with your name, contact details, parish details, and wedding date/location on the front. Give this cheque/cash to your Priest, which he will send to the Chancellor.

34. What is the process if I am getting married somewhere else in the world and not in England and Wales?

Once you have completed the marriage preparation courses and signed all the documents in front of your Parish Priest, he must send them all to the Chancellor including a £20 cheque which you should provide made payable to 'RC Diocese of East Anglia', or cash in an envelope with your name, contact, parish details, and wedding date/location on the front.

The Chancellor will check all your documentation to see it is correct and deal with any Dispensations or Permissions that you require. He will then prepare a letter to the Chancellor in the Diocese where you are intending to marry, wherever that may be around the world.

All this paperwork will then be sent back to your Parish Priest in East Anglia with an accompanying letter and a special envelope to be used by a courier service. Your Parish Priest will then give the documents to you and you are to arrange for a courier to send them abroad (everything will be addressed already).

The courier will provide you with a Tracking Number and then the Chancellor of the Diocese in which you will be married or a member of the Diocesan Curia will sign for it. It works beautifully so do not panic. Most couriers are able to deliver anywhere in the world within five working days. Once the paperwork has arrived at the Diocese where you will be married the Chancellor there will send it to the exact Parish where you will be married.

We aim for the paperwork to arrive about 4 weeks before the wedding date

<u>PLEASE DO NOT</u> send the documents using the Postal Service. Once post leaves this country there is no way of assuring it will reach its destination on time (we have experience of this happening!). It needs to be sent as a tracked delivery using a courier service (e.g. *DHL*).

<u>PLEASE DO NOT</u> give the documents to relatives to deliver by hand or try to take them personally yourself to the Diocese where you are getting married. We have had this happen and the documents will be rejected and refused by the receiving Diocese because they could have been interfered with. The documents are considered the **personal correspondence** of the Chancellor of East Anglia to the Chancellor in the receiving Diocese, so they must be couriered directly and not hand delivered.



35. What is the timescale for the paperwork?

The Priests will complete your paperwork only after you have completed your marriage preparation course.

If you are getting married abroad, we aim for it to arrive in the Diocese where you are getting married about *one month* before your wedding date.

36. We are already civilly married, do we need to complete the Statutory Declaration of Freedom to Marry form?

No. Please bring your civil marriage certificate to the appointment with the Priest.

37. We have already completed a Statutory Declaration of Freedom to Marry form in a different country/embassy/consulate, do we need to do another one here?

No, that will be acceptable. Please bring it to the appointment with the Priest.

38. What is the earliest I can arrange to sign this paperwork with my Parish Priest?

Maximum of six months before the wedding once you have completed the preparation course and have your certificates and paperwork ready.

But do make sure you have spoken to him already (via email or face-to-face after Mass) letting him know of your intentions to marry etc.

39. We are from the Syro-Malabar Rite, do we need to do any extra paperwork?

No

40. I have been previously married but have now divorced and received an annulment. Do I still fill in the Declaration of Freedom to Marry form?

Yes, but write on the form that you have received an annulment.

Make sure you bring your annulment paperwork with you to the appointment with the Priest.

41. I was previously married but now my spouse is deceased.

If there has been a previous spouse, who is now deceased, the priest will need a copy of their death certificate.

42. I would like to be Confirmed, how can I go about organising that?

It is a good thing to be Confirmed and you are encouraged to be confirmed before your wedding if possible. Contact your Parish Priest as soon as possible to speak to him about that.



43. Can you suggest any readings for our wedding ceremony	43.	Can vo	u suggest a	ny readings	for our	wedding	ceremony	٧?
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You can usually choose your own readings for your wedding. These must be from the Bible.

The Liturgy of the Word during a Nuptial Mass consists of the following readings:

- A First Reading from the Old Testament
- A *Responsorial Psalm* (usually sung by a cantor while the congregation respond, or can be said)
- A Second Reading from the New Testament
- A Gospel Reading from one of the four Gospels
- Prayer of the Faithful

All readings must come from the Bible, and cannot be replaced by any other text.

Below I have listed suggestions for the First Reading, Responsorial Psalm, Second Reading, Gospel and Prayer of the Faithful.

Reading Suggestions

OLD TESTAMENT READING:

GENESIS 1:26-28, 31

A reading from the book of Genesis.

Then God said:

"Let us make man in our image, after our likeness.
Let them have dominion over the fish of the sea,
the birds of the air, and the cattle,
and over all the wild animals
and all the creatures that crawl on the ground."
God created man in his image;
in the divine image he created him;
male and female he created them.
God blessed them, saying:
"Be fertile and multiply; fill the earth and subdue it.
Have dominion over the fish of the sea, the birds of the air,
and all the living things that move on the earth."
Go looked at everything he had made,
and he found it very good.

GENESIS 2:18-24

A reading from the book of Genesis.

The LORD God said:

"It is not good for the man to be alone.

I will make a suitable partner for him."

So the LORD God formed out of the ground various wild animals and various birds of the air, and he brought them to the man to see what he would call them; whatever the man called each of them would be its name.

The man gave names to all the cattle, all the birds of the air, and all the wild animals;

but none proved to be the suitable partner for the man.

GENESIS 24:48-51, 58-67

A reading from the book of Genesis.

The servant of Abraham said to Laban:

"Then I bowed down in worship to the LORD,

blessing the LORD, the God of my master Abraham,

who had led me on the right road

to obtain the daughter of my master's kinsman for his son.

If, therefore, you have in mind to show true loyalty to my master, let me know;

but if not, let me know that, too.

I can then proceed accordingly."

A reading from the letter of Saint Paul to the Colossians.

Brothers and sisters: Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if one has a grievance against another; as the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do.

And over all these put on love, that is, the bond of perfection. And let the peace of Christ control your hearts, the peace into which you were also called in one body.

And be thankful.

Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, as in all wisdom you teach and admonish one another, singing psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs with gratitude in your hearts to God. And whatever you do, in word or in deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

Let marriage be honored among all and the marriage bed be kept undefiled. Let your life be free from love of money but be content with what you have, for he has said, "I will never forsake you or abandon you."

Thus we may say with confidence:

"The Lord is my helper, and I will not be afraid.

1 PETER 3:1-9

A reading from the first letter of Saint Peter.

Beloved, You wives should be subordinate to your husbands so that, even if some disobey the word, they may be won over without a word by their wives' conduct when they observe your reverent and chaste behavior. Your adornment should not be an external one: braiding the hair, wearing gold jewelry, or dressing in fine clothes, but rather the hidden character of the heart, expressed in the imperishable beauty of a gentle and calm disposition, which is precious in the sight of God.

For this is also how the holy women who hoped in God once used to adorn themselves and were subordinate to their husbands; thus Sarah obeyed Abraham, calling him "lord." You are her children when you do what is good and fear no intimidation.

Likewise, you husbands should live with your wives in understanding, showing honor to the weaker female sex, since we are joint heirs of the gift of life, so that your prayers may not be hindered.

Finally, all of you, be of one mind, sympathetic, loving toward one another, compassionate, humble. Do not return evil for evil, or insult for insult; but, on the contrary, a blessing, because to this you were called, that you might inherit a blessing.

NEW TESTAMENT READING:

I JOHN 3:18-24 D12

A reading from the first letter of Saint John.

Children, let us love one another not in word or speech but in deed and truth. Now this is how we shall know that we belong to the truth and reassure our hearts before him in whatever our hearts condemn, for God is greater than our hearts and knows everything. Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have confidence in God and receive from him whatever we ask, because we keep his commandments and do what pleases him.

And his commandment is this: we should believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another just as he commanded us. Those who keep his commandments remain in him, and he in them, and the way we know that he remains in us is from the Spirit that he gave us.

1 JOHN 4:7-12

A reading from the first letter of Saint John.

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is of God; everyone who loves is begotten by God and knows God. Whoever is without love, does not know God, for God is love. In this way the love of God was revealed to us: God sent his only Son into the world so that we might have life through him. In this is love: not that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son as expiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also must love one another. No one has ever seen God. Yet, if we love one another, God remains in us, and his love is brought to perfection in us.

NEW TESTAMENT READING:

REVELATION 19:1, 5-9a

A reading from the book of Revelation.

I, John, heard what sounded like the loud voice of a great multitude in heaven, saying: "Alleluia! Salvation, glory, and might belong to our God."

A voice coming from the throne said: "Praise our God, all you his servants, and you who revere him, small and great."

Then I heard something like the sound of a great multitude or the sound of rushing water or mighty peals of thunder, as they said: "Alleluia! The Lord has established his reign, our God, the almighty.

Let us rejoice and be glad and give him glory.

For the wedding day of the Lamb has come, his bride has made herself ready. She was allowed to wear a bright, clean, linen garment." The linen represents the righteous deeds of the holy ones. Then the angel said to me, "Write this: blessed are those who have been called to the wedding feast of the Lamb."

Gospel Reading for a Catholic Wedding

The final reading in a Catholic wedding is always chosen from one of the four Gospels; Matthew, Mark, Luke and John . These were written during the latter half of the first century A.D. Each tells the story of Jesus through the memory of a distinct Christian community,

Many of the gospel readings for Catholic weddings are not explicitly about marriage but about the love of Christians for one another and about the call to discipleship. The passages remind us that Christian marriage is a particular way of living out one's vocation to love and to be a disciple of Jesus Christ.

GOSPEL READING:

MATTHEW 5:1-12a

A reading from the holy gospel according to Matthew.

When Jesus saw the crowds, he went up the mountain, and after he had sat down, his disciples came to him. He began to teach them, saying:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted.

Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the land.

Blessed are they who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be satisfied.

Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy.

Blessed are the clean of heart, for they will see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers, for they will be called children of God.

Blessed are they who are persecuted for the sake of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are you when they insult you and persecute you and utter every kind of evil against you falsely because of me.

Rejoice and be glad, for your reward will be great in heaven."

MATTHEW 5:13-16

A reading from the holy gospel according to Matthew.

Jesus said to his disciples: "You are the salt of the earth. But if salt loses its taste, with what can it be seasoned? It is no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot.
